Course Description

Students in the summer intensive Introductory Biblical Hebrew sequence learn the fundamentals of Hebrew as this language is employed in the Hebrew Bible. We will begin by studying the rudiments of biblical Hebrew phonology and pronunciation and proceed, over the course of the session, to delve into biblical Hebrew nominal and verbal morphology and syntax through exercises in reading and composition. To facilitate this reading and writing, students will master a broad vocabulary that touches on all areas of life, from agriculture and animal husbandry to theology and politics. By means of these approaches, we will equip ourselves with the essential tools for exploring the fascinating and complex literature of ancient Israel and Judah. There are no prerequisites for this course.

Learning Objectives

By the end of the summer session, students will be able to

- read biblical Hebrew texts aloud.
- analyze and produce biblical Hebrew nominal morphology.
- analyze and produce biblical Hebrew verbal morphology.
- write basic biblical Hebrew sentences involving essential syntactic structures.
- recognize and use a biblical Hebrew vocabulary of around 500 lexemes.
- read prose biblical Hebrew texts with the aid of a dictionary.

Class Organization

This class will meet daily Monday–Friday for six weeks. Each class meeting will be 3 hours long. We will take short breaks between each hour of class. The breakdown of daily meetings is:

- 9-10 AM: Review of homework and questions
- 10-11: Introduction of new material
- 11-12: "Lab Time" and Co-Educational Activity Lab time will be used in a variety of ways. In most cases, there will be interactive activities designed to supplement the introduction of new material and give students an opportunity to practice and absorb the information.

Hebrew (and Aramaic) text of the complete Hebrew Bible, abbreviation "BHS." • Search "Biblia Hebraica Stuttgartensia" on Amazon.com or another online bookseller. You should pull up a brown volume with ISBN 978-1598561630 for roughly \$45. ***DO NOT** purchase the "Reader's Edition." This has running Hebrew-English vocabulary at the bottom and other "cribbing" features that will make it difficult for you to actually learn Hebrew.

Basic lexicon (dictionary), abbreviation "BDB." • There exist numerous reprints of this volume. The Hendrickson (Publishers) reprint is the most commonly used. Find this by searching "Brown Driver Briggs" on Amazon.com or other online bookseller. You should pull up a green and gold volume with ISBN 978-1565632066 for roughly \$25.

Students are expected to come to class meetings having completed all the assigned readings for that day and any assignments. Attendance is required at all sessions. Please be sure to arrive in class on time. Unless there is an emergency, there is no reason to leave class early. Due to the condensed nature of the summer term, each absence is the equivalent of missing a full week in a regular semester - with less of an opportunity to make up for missed material. If students must miss a class, they should contact the instructor beforehand whenever possible to try to make alternative arrangements for catching up on material they have missed.

Assessment: Homework/Quizzes/Exams

Daily homework will draw from the Hackett textbook as well as supplementary handouts. We will have a short quiz every Friday. Material will draw form the material treated that week. The midterm and the final exams in this class will be structured similarly. Students will be expected to complete paradigms, translate short biblical phrases or passages, and answer specific questions about grammatical features. Each section of the exam will be labeled with the number of points it is worth out of 100 total points. Partial credit will be given wherever appropriate.

Missed Work and Makeup Exams

Student success in this course requires completing all course assignments on the day in which they are due. It will be challenging to catch up if you begin to miss daily work. I understand that all types of circumstances intervene. All homework can be submitted without penalty up to three days after it is assigned. There are two exams in this class, one in week 3 and one in week 6. Students are permitted one make-up exam during the course. Make-up exams must be taken within 3 days of the original exam date.

Grading

Final course grades will be assigned according to the following scale: 100-95=A, 94-90=A-, 89-87=B+, 86-83=B, 82-80=B-, 79-77=C+, 76-73=C, 72-70=C-, 69-60=D, 59-0=F. (S/N: S=70%).
