Social scientists have for many years sought to explain, in as parsimonious a way as possible, why it was that the common culture of Western Christendom brought forth such very different kinds of states in the period before the French Revolution. Unfortunately, the existing theories that attempt to do this are inadequate because they make claims about the principal cases which recent historical research has refuted. This book presents a new theory of statebuilding in medieval and early modern Europe which accounts in a more satisfactory way for the pattern of outcomes specified by the historical literature. It argues, in brief, that two factors--the organization of local government at the time of state formation and the timing of the onset of sustained geo-military competition--can explain most of the variation in political regimes and in state infrastructures found across the continent during the second half of the 18th century. This theory has broad implications for our understanding of the process of political development more generally.

Beginning in the spring of 1990, the highly complex (and successful) legal, political and socio-economic order of West Germany was introduced in toto into the former German Democratic Republic. Yet how would a liberal-democratic framework developed over forty years in the West function in a territory which had known only dictatorship since 1933? Who have been the winners and losers of this unique case of institutional transfer? And are the

eastern states doomed to become the united Germany's Mezzogiorno? These questions are addressed in four specially commissioned articles by Gerhard Lehmbruch, Ruediger Pohl, Katherina Bluhm and Ulrich Eith.

Nearly three decades have passed since Arend Lijphart introduced the concept of "consociational democracy" into the social science literature. Over that period, the political and economic trajectories of the classic consociational countries--the Netherlands, Belgium, Switzerland and Austria--have diverged ever more substantially. This book aims to explain this growing divergence among these four democracies as well as quasi-consociational Germany by bringing together the "fathers" of consociational theory (Arend Lijphart, Hans Daalder, Gerhard Lehmbruch, Jürg Steiner) and younger scholars working in the field of comparative political economy. In so doing, it seeks both to reevaluate consociational theory and to generate insights based on the recent European experience that will be relevant to the design of consociational arrangements elsewhere

Opera is certainly one of the most complex art forms, combining as it does music, drama, stage design and occasionally dance. Until recently, academic writings on opera have rarely done justice to its interdisciplinary character. All this changed in the wake of the so-called "turns" in the social sciences and humanities. Inspired by these turns, opera studies have witnessed a tremendous burst of creativity over the past decade and a half. Yet disciplinary boundaries, especially those between musicology and the social sciences, have hindered cooperation among those working in this field. This volume aims to overcome these boundaries by bringing together for the first time in one place original contributions by musicologists, political scientists, sociologists and literary critics all of which explore, from a variety of perspectives, the relationship between opera and society in France and Italy.

1. <u>Taming the Leviathan: Building Democratic Nation-States in 19th and 20th Century Western Europe.</u>

In the immediate aftermath of World War One, as the culmination of a process that had its roots in the French Revolution, all twelve long-established Western European states had become democracies. Despite the many crises of the interwar years, eight of these states would remain democratic, but four others would introduce varying forms of dictatorship with devastating human and material consequences for the continent as a whole. This book offers a new explanation for these outcomes. It argues that the development of honest party-based government before World War One held the key to democratic survival during the turbulent decades after 1918.
